News from Kippax Greeenfield Primary School

This term we went mad for Science at our second House Day of the year at Kippax Greenfield Primary School. The children spent the day in their four houses: Brimham Rocks, Flamborough Head, Dalby Forest and Aysgarth Falls with mixed age range children in each.

Each house had a session in an inflatable planetanium, learning about the stars and planets we can see out of our windows at night. This was an amazing experience as we whizzed across the galaxy and picked up a lot of stargazing tips while Zee from Immersive Theatre explained what we were gazing at! The planetanium visit was funded by fundraising by our Friends and Relatives of Greenfield School team and included a session for younger siblings and parents at the end of the school day.

We were also visited by a real life physicist, Lizzie Boyes, who taught each house about aerodynamics and forces as we built and flow rockets in the Discovery Room. Lizzie is a STEM Ambassador from the National STEM Centre who with schools to promote inspirational careers for children.

The rest of the House Day was spent experiencing all sorts of scientific activities such as making and flying parachutes, inflating balloons without blowing in them, keeping an ice cube from melting, designing ways of stopping an egg break when we dropped them from the bridge and many more...

LEEDS INDEPENDENT VISITOR SCHEME

The Leeds Independent Visitor Scheme was set up in 1991 in response to the Children's Act 1989. An Independent Visitor (IV) is a volunteer who befriends and visits a child or young person living in the care of the local authority. They also provide support and advice, which contributes towards the child's social, emotional and educational development.





They are called 'independent Visitors' because, in this role, they are voluntieers and are not part of the paid children's services workforce, they work purely for the benefit of the looked after child or young person. Independent Visitors are hugely valued by the young people as they are often the only people involved in their lives who are not paid to be there.

All looked after children have the right to be appointed an Independent Visitor, if they wish. We generally provide volunteers for children over 5 years of age and we have recently extended the service to include support for care leavers.

An independent Visitor will visit the child or young person on a monthly basis, with the aim of establishing a consistent, positive adult-child relationship. This one to one relationship can involve anything from football in the park, seeing the latest films, or new things that the young person and independent Visitor want to dol in addition to the one to one activities we work to provide group activities which independent Visitors and their young person can access if they choose to. An activity budget and travel expenses are provided each month.

Leeds has the largest Independent Visitor Scheme in the country, with 107 young people currently matched to a volunteer and a further 18 who are in the matching process. However, we also have a further 43 young people who are on a waiting fist, with more referrals being received every week, and this is where we need your help! Volunteers do not need to have experience or qualifications but they do need to have a genuine interest in children and be able to demonstrate a commitment to improving their wellbeing and welfare. We do ask that volunteers be able to commit to the scheme for at least 2



years. Volunteers are provided with training and support throughout their time with the scheme.

The scheme operates under Safer Recruitment Practices and all volunteers will be expected to undergo an enhanced check with the Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS, formerly CRB).



I REMEMBER

I remember the open fields and meadows that bordered the footpath as I walked to school when I was young. There were no swimming baths, no Wimpey houses – nothing past the terrace houses on my left at Station Road until Orchard House – which no longer exists-and the terraced houses that reach and overtake the corner of Butt Hill without a break.

These fields often made me late, so many distractions, water hens and other fowl were often seen scuttering across the boggy land, exploring the tree lined beck that slipped under the road, wending its way alongside the allotments and on and on towards Brigshaw Lane and beyond.

Some days in the late Spring, the stretch of road from above the beck to Orchard House was often difficult to negotiate. The road and footpath used to heave and undulate with millions of leaping, baby brown frogs. It was like trying to walk on rolling brown water as the frogs leapt to cross the road to escape the boggy meadows to hide in the lush open fields beyond. It was impossible to put a foot down without treading on these tiny creatures. This never ending leaping mass of frogs made it seem we were walking on a slick brown ocean.

They were so numerous and each barely half an inch long that one day, it was just impossible to resist filling my pockets, intending to take them into school to show the teacher, and show off of course, but it didn't quite work out like I intended.

Catching frogs was great fun but ran away with a lot of time so being very late; again, the scolding sent the frogs into oblivion until break time. It was puzzling how it was always the girls who ran back to the classroom screaming. I could never understand it. Frogs, especially baby ones, never hurt anybody, and the resulting pandemonium made it impossible to own up to the river of leaping frogs in the cloakroom.

Wondering what was going to happen to the frogs bothered me for ages. I wanted them to be safe and put back into the meadow, but I was too cowardly to ask. I had brothers to answer to as well as the teachers – and as it was the boys who got the blame and hauled I think, to the heads office. I chose to worry on the quiet.

So sorry boys, if you still remember that is. Otherwise – least said – soonest mended Although after nigh on 75 years. Who cares?


KIPPAX DRAMATIC SOCIETY



Hi I would like to ask your readers what they think of the broadband we get in the Kippax area. Kippax is no longer a small hamlet or village we are now a town and I would say that every home has at least one comp or Laptop but the broadband we get is so slow and it needs something doing to improve or make it better. I got in touch with a company that boasts about faster broadband went through all the chit chat then was told that they can not give me broadband in my area because the Parish council will not let them come in to our area. The reason why we have a bad broadband is because it come from Garforth and the cables are old and out dated.

Editors' note: The above letter received the following replies:

I was intrigued by your letter and the information that you have been given, so much so that I have copied our MP and local City Councillors into this reply.

You claim to have been told that it is the Parish Council that is preventing fast broadband in this area, this is totally untrue. We are not even consulted regarding broadband provision in Kippax but agree that it needs improving.

After reading your letter I had a look at a website www.cable.co.uk which comes up with 104 deals for broadband ranging from 8 mbps to 38 mbps. This depends on what you want to pay. The site goes on to point out the variances by area for Kippax.

Station Road/ Butt hill/ Westfield Lane average 11 mbps
Leeds Road 3 - 26 mbps
North of the High Street / Ascot Road/Goodwoods 1 - 17 mbps
Gibson Lane 2 - 3 mbps
Sandgate Drive/Cross hills 18 - 27 mbps

I do not have your address so cannot comment on where you are.

There is also a website for Ofcom which is the regulatory body for telecom providers should you wish to address your complaint direct to them www.consumers.ofcom.org.uk

I hope this information is of use to you

The problem at the moment is that all the Broadband in Kippax uses BT's telephone infrastructure, which in some cases dates back to the days of telephones with dials and bells! Virgin is due to install higher quality fibre-to-home infrastructure so offer competition over the summer. I hope this is helpful and I will try and get some more detailed info on what Virgin are up to. Kind regards

INFO FROM POLICE


This is a paragraph from a Newsletter sent from the office of Mark Burns-Williamson, West Yorkshire's Police and Crime Commissioner.

Protecting frontline policing.

Hundreds more police officers can now be recruited and Police Community Support Officer (PCSO) numbers can be protected. We know that what people want is more local visible policing and 76% of thousands surveyed on the budget said they would pay more for neighbourhood policing and more 'bobbies on the beat'. It will cost taxpayers, on average, less than eight pence a week.
