

Girl guiding is as popular in Kippax and its surrounding areas as it ever was.





# KIPPAX IN BLOOM

It is that time of year again. No, I don't mean it's summer. (Actually, has that arrived yet?) I mean that the village magazine requires another article, giving the problem of trying to be fresh and not repeat the content of previous articles. However, the nature of 'Blooming' is cyclical, following a similar pattern year on year - designing, digging, weeding, pruning, planting, and of course litter-picking.

Having said that, this year is a special year as we proudly represent Yorkshire in the Britain in Bloom competition. I hope you have all seen the banners attached to lampposts at entrances to the village. On Thursday 11th August the judges from the Royal Horticultural Society will descend on Kippax and decide just how successful Kippax in Bloom has been this year. Consequently, by the time you read this all will have been done and dusted, although the results will not be known until October.

Being in Britain in Bloom brings new challenges and also requires new developments, not just a repetition of past years. And so the preparations are in full swing. Below is a sample of a few of the things being done

It has been great to see and appreciate the facelift given to the Library and with our help they have put colourful planters outside.

Thanks to the Parish Council with the support of Leeds City Council, the war memorial and the gardens surrounding it has also had a very welcome facelift Nic Alderson, the dry-stone waller, is building a cairn in the shape of a beehive to celebrate our entry into British in Bloom, (remember that in the last edition of the magazine it was reported that volunteers a giant bee) while Dave of local firm 'Drive Reviver' has cleaned Butt Hill Gardens and the Wells Garden. Both are local residents helping Britain in Bloom.

At Calvert Close, a Dutch style of planting perennials, with a path of sleepers through the bed and pale coloured gravel has been developed.

Large Trachycarpus palms were planted outside the Co-op to give a tropical feel.

With the help of cubs and scouts following the instructions of Barry, a volunteer at the RSPB at Fairburn Ings, a bug hotel was created in the Wild Life garden. Volunteers worked with pupils at Kippax North Primary School to plant a vegetable garden. The pupils also rehearsed a speech to be made to the Britain in Bloom judges.

At the time of writing, Christine Porter is writing a poem to welcome those same judges. Many thanks go to her. We are also grateful to the pupils of Greenfields School who have produced colourful posters to adorn the route the judges will take.

It is also pleasing to note that we have some new volunteers which is very welcome.





# HELLO FROM EVERYONE AT KIPPAX COMMUNITY HUB

So our fantastic new Kippax Community Hub opened on the 9<sup>th</sup> May in the library building which is newly re-furbished. This is proving to be an ever more popular facility as word spreads as to what we can offer. It is a fantastic asset to the community plus there is now increased access to library services, as opening hours have increased from 21 hours a week to 44 hours! Library facilities including photocopying, black and white and colour A4 & A3, scanning, access to daily newspapers etc. continue as normal.

Customer Services are now available in the hub to provide help with all aspects of housing, refuse, disabled parking badges, housing and council tax benefit and many other council services. Please note there is a limited access to customer service enquiries on Saturdays and after 4.45pm on weekdays. There is also a Jobshop which provides people with help and support for getting back into work, updating your C.V, looking for Apprenticeships etc. A job vacancies file is available with current jobs and apprenticeships you can apply for, please call in and take a look.

The Community Hub continues to offer free computer access, and printing facilities are available for which a charge of 20p per A4 copy is payable.

# **Self Serve Computers**

Public computers in the hub now have a link to the Leeds City Council Once Stop Self Service Page where you can make online council enquiries yourself such as Register for Council Tax billing, make a payment online, help with budgeting/Debt Advice, bid for a home, report a housing repair, apply for a Job with Leeds City Council.

We also have a Freephone situated upstairs in Kippax Community Hub where you can make phone calls to other council services such as Local Welfare Support, Adult and Children's Services, Planning, DWP/Job Centre plus and other organisations such as Step Change (free debt advice) and Victim Support.

# WE SHALL REMEMBER

On a bright summer's day in 1916, thousands of men waited. The roar of artiflery broke the stillness of the morning, lasting for approximately an hour and a half, then stopped and silence ensued for a few moments. This was broken by sound of whistles and the waiting men did their duty. This was the start of the bettle of the Somme.

The date 1" July 1916, the time 07:30.

By the end of the day over 57,000 men were either dead or wounded.

So today 1st July 2016, we stand at our memorial for those brave men who died in that battle, to remember them and all who fell in that war and have fallen since and to rededicate our memorial.

The rededication started with people gathering in the memorial garden for 7:00pm. At 7:15 a single church bell tolled and the rededication of the memorial took place, starting with poems read by the children from the Friday Feelings Youth Club (Methodist church).





The rededication was led by Revd. Canon Rosemary Hayes from St. Mary's assisted by Revd. Andrew Checkley from the Methodist church.

The rededication was followed by the laying of wreaths in remembrance of those who fell on that first day and subsequent days – as the wreaths were laid the names of those from Kippax who fell on that day and subsequent days were read out.





At 7:30 three blasts from a whistle were sounded to signify the moment when those brave men went "over the top".

A beacon was lit as Nigel and Nicola Darbyshire from Kippax Brass Band played the last post, followed by two minutes silence broken by the playing of Reveille. The ceremony concluded with the singing of the National Anthem and a blessing by the Revd. Canon Rosemary Hayes.







# STEPPING UP TO THE CHALLENGE

The Lower Aire Valley Volunteers have been hard at work these past couple of months; with two large projects to complete before June it was a race against time to finish the work.

Ledston Luck Nature Reserve saw a range of changes with improvements to access around the whole reserve. The volunteers installed waymakers for a circular route, interpretation boards and the finale was a flight of 48 woodland steps making the site accessible from another entrance. With this new infrastructure and a new fence, the site is now looking forward to having cattle grazing the grasslands for a couple of months this autumn. The Yorkshire Wildlife Trust use cattle as a conservation grazing tool as they are brilliant at removing the old rank grasses, they improve the species diversity by controlling the dominant grasses and through disturbing the soil they create clear areas that flowers can seed.


Other tasks that the volunteers have been involved in this summer are the clearance of paths, Himalayan balsam pulling and litter picking. You would not believe the number of bags of litter that have been filled these past months. On just one of our nature reserves, Kippax Meadows, we pulled off 17 bags of litter in just 2 hours!

Looking ahead to our autumn and winter programme of work there are a range of tasks to keep the volunteer group going, from hay cutting and raking at Hollinghurst wood and Townclose Hills to scrub clearance on Kippax Meadows and some coppicing and thinning in Billy Wood and Owl wood.

# YOUR COMMENTS

# To All residents of Kippax

You may be aware there was a Public Inquiry in Leeds Civic Hall on the 5th July to decide on an appeal made by Persimmon Homes against Leeds City Council rejection of an application to build 156 houses behind Sandgate Drive. This has been going on since August 2013 when the application was first submitted. There isn't enough space to give you the whole history but this was the opportunity to confirm that the decision to reject building was correct as there are more sustainable sites in the area and it was not allocated for housing by Leeds City Council in their draft local site plan.

Sandgate Residents Association applied for a special status so we could appear alongside the Council at the Inquiry to support this position, a lot of work for me personally and for other residents. However 5 days before the Inquiry on the 30th June the Council informed me they would not defend their decision at the Appeal and would be withdrawing all the evidence of their case as they had been informed they had lost another similar appeal and the timing was "unfortunate" . They made a decision to sacrifice this site in Kippax and residents views to the situation. We decided it was still important that our views were heard so we defended the appeal for two days on our own against the Persimmon team of lawyers and experts - a team of 9 people. The Council Barrister and Solicitor sat through the two day process and said nothing.

Some local residents did attend the Inquiry and I was very grateful for their support, many didn't as they thought as we had obviously lost what was the point, I can understand, but I was disappointed. It was very important that we attended as we were able to influence some key areas. If the development goes ahead and it will probably be a number of weeks before we find out, we have influenced the phasing of the development, the conditions that will be attached including affordable housing to be for local people first. If and when the construction management plan is discussed covering hours of work, parking etc we will have input and have already made suggestions. Pease note it was Sandgate residents and not our local Councillors who were in this meeting for nearly 2 hours discussing this to inform the Inspector of what to possibly include in the conditions.

I am personally feeling very let down and bruised by the situation and the Council choosing to turn their back on us, there are a lot of considerations I know and Leeds has some very difficult challenges ahead with its housing policy but not standing by the people who elected you is never justifiable. I hope they take a long look at what happened and why and learn some lessons otherwise they will no doubt be punished at the ballot box.

# A VIEW FROM A KIPPAX GARDEN by EBG Jardinero

Most days I get some joy associated with plants or gardens; whether it's mine, someone else's or from being in the countryside.

How do I define what I get from it? My dictionary says that the definition of 'a garden' is 'a piece of land for growing flowers, fruit or vegetables'.

From my own experience and listening to the opinion of others, I see it as a much wider picture.

For me, it's not just about growing flowers, fruit and vegetables, but I see my garden as a part of nature as a whole, with everyone else's gardens and the countryside, combined. Plus, I do get a lot of pleasure from doing the actual gardening but there are also times when I go into a garden, just to relax. Very important for my mental welfare as well as my physical.

I prefer to garden organically, which means not using artificial pesticides or fertilisers. I have to accept that sometimes pests will win a battle but hopefully not the war.

I need to try and outwit them whether this is netting cabbages to keep pigeons off or removing the tops of broad bean stems, when blackfly have gathered there, as they find the soft tips easier to pierce to suck sap from which weakens the plants.

I've also put piles of logs in quiet comers to encourage hedgehogs as they are allies of the gardener, eating pests such as snails, which are so attracted to the leaves of my hostas.

I do like to relax in the garden and I have a number of seats and low walls where I can sit down and admire the views, take it all in and proverbially sniff the roses.

Whilst I still forget to water some beds now and then, losing plants in the process, I have been much more disciplined over the summer months this year, in trimming back plants that have got too wide for their space. I buy them small and when they grow, they outgrow their neighbours and I end up losing plants because they can't cope with the shade and competition. The picture shows a gold leaved mock orange after the sides have been pruned, keeping enough of its own flowering shoots to bloom later. The agapenthus below it then have the chance to show off their own flower spikes.



### Jobs for the Months Ahead

September – keep feeding and deadheading bedding plants until they are defeated by frosts. Harvest apples and pears and store in a frost free and dark place. It's the time to start planting daffodils in the ground and containers.

October – apply an autumn lawn feed, don't use a summer one as it will encourage lush growth that will be spoilt in winter conditions. Lift, divide and replant herbaceous perennials (they die down every year) such as primulas and asters

November – prune long stems of roses by a third to prevent them rocking in winter wind.

Use a lawn rake to remove thatch and moss, spike it to get some air into compacted turf and brush in lawn sand into the resulting holes. Leave the flower heads on grasses for show over winter and they give forage, and somewhere to hide, for wildlife.
