A VIEW FROM A KIPPAX GARDEN by EBG Jardinero

The Bee's Needs

I was walking round Roundhay Park a little while ago and came across the Chelsea Flower Show gardens for the first time. It was a warm sunny day and the flowers were in full bloom. I was staggered with the volume of buzzing in the air from all the different types of bees that were busy gathering pollen and nectar. When I was a lot younger, I only knew about 2 sorts of bees: 'bee-ing' honeybees and bumblebees and there were many more types in the Park that day.

It made me want to know more and it turns out that in the U.K. there are 24 species of bumblebees alone. With over 250 other species of bees, I was only 252 species short on my

Sadly 20 species have been lost since the beginning of the last century and 35 are presently under threat. 97% of wildflower meadows have been lost since the 1940's.

Why does it matter? Along with hoverflies, beetles, moths and butterflies, bees are essential to keeping the variety of plants and wildlife as rich as it is and they play an absolutely key

> role in food production, due to the pollinating they do.

So as gardeners, what can we do to

Mining bees: e.g. Tawny mining bees, dig out nest tunnels and cells in the ground. Cavity nesting

bees such as masons, carders, masked and leafcutters (great names I think) will use pre-existing cavities e.g. hollow plant stems or holes bored by beetles in dead wood.

So having a variety of nesting habitats helps and these include plant stems, undisturbed compost heaps and log piles, different lengths of grass and some bare patches of soil here and there.

In addition, aim to grow a wide variety of native and near native flowers, providing nectar and pollen for them across all seasons. Crocuses are especially beneficial early in the year

Fungi

Some 120000 fungi species have been described by people who name and define groups of biological organisms and yet there is an estimate that there could be two million! I've never seen that many on any walk

Something's had a nibble

Autumn is the time when many fruiting bodies of fungi show themselves and it's great to be out walking and spot some of thom.

Words of caution though as I've been on a number of

organised walks with experts and of the ones we saw, they will point out which are poisonous and which aren't. I may not remember properly though, even if I have my field guide with me. So I have a rule that I never eat or even touch any fungi when I'm out, as some can drop a horse if ingested.

They all have Latin names but many have at least one common name: Chicken of the Woods, Amethyst Deceiver, Destroying Angel, Beefsteak Fungus, Stinkhorn Fungus and Turkey Tails are some examples.

Fungi facts are astonishing for their scale. Underneath the fruiting bodies are tiny threads called hyphae and these form a network called a mycelium. There could be 100 metres of hyphae in a gram of soil and in a hectare of British woodlands; there may be three and a half tonnes of fungit

Some fungi break down dead organic matter and return the nutrients to the soil for other plants to use, therefore preventing the build-up of dead leaves and other matter. Woods are particularly good places to see them either on the ground or on trees. For the latter, dead or decaying ones make the best hosts.

Jobs for the months ahead

December – Apply a dry mulch such as chipped bark over tender herbaceous plants such as dahlias and Agapanthus. Plant fruit trees and bushes in well manured soil. Clean feeders and birdbaths regularly with a garden disinfectant. Move plants such as Phalaenopsis (moth orchids) to an east- or west-facing windowsill to maximise light.

January – Don't stand on borders when working on them, use boards to reduce compaction. Cover ground with polythene to warm soil before planting and sowing. Plan a crop rotation system for vegetables, leaving at two years before replanting crops in the same place, if possible.

February – Trim winter flowering heathers when flowers fade. If algae and lichen have grown on lawns, spike with a fork or use a lawn aerator. Top dress tree and soft fruit with sulphate of potash. Prune deciduous hedges before birds start nesting in them.

Pot pouri

Both bees and fungi are fantastic for young inquisitive minds to spot and hopefully any enthusiasm they have at an early age, will continue into later years. They can both be dangerous though and should always be treated with respect and with an appropriate level of supervision.

Don't worry, BEE happy.

This was enviously uttered by my grandchildren after we had been for a pre-opening ride on the long awaited 'wheeled facility' or Skateboard Park on Kippax Common.


It was early but already keen boarders were there with music and eye-watering skills. They were friendly, polite and continued to keep sweeping the dirt/dust away for us.



DAISY BIRTHING CLASSES

Kayleigh Burton (of Sherburn-in-Elmet, North Yorkshire) endured a tough journey to motherhood. Now, she wants to help other mums-to-be by launching Daisy Birthing antenatal classes in the area between Leeds, York and Selby.

Kayleigh, 31, and her husband Matt suffered 4 heart-breaking miscarriages between June 2011 and April 2013, before having 2 children (April 2014 and July 2016). Since then, the couple have *raised awareness of miscarriage in the media, raised money for miscarriage research,* and *published a blog* about their experiences.

Now, Kayleigh plans to help other local mums through their motherhood journey by launching *The Daisy Foundation: Garforth, Selby and Tadcaster.* This will begin when Kayleigh starts leading Daisy Birthing classes in Monk Fryston in November 2017.

Kayleigh says "I am so passionate about helping women to achieve the birth they wish for, empowering them to feel prepared and confident in their birth choices, and nurturing them in a safe and supportive environment."

Daisy Birthing – one of the Daisy Foundation Social Enterprise programmes, anchors active birth and antenatal education to a woman's breath, body and movement.

All birth choices are supported and classes educate women not only about active birth but also relaxation, medical inductions and interventions, to promote a more positive pregnancy, enabling women to prepare for birth.

The classes aim to promote a more enjoyable pregnancy, taking women through yoga based movements which help with common problems including carpal tunnel syndrome, heartburn and swollen hands and feet.

Classes can be adapted for women of all shapes and sizes, and for those with pregnancy-related medical conditions.

Choice, confidence and community are The Daisy Foundation's underlying values and local women whether they attend classes or not also have access to information through the website on everything surrounding birth and babies so they can make informed decisions. Community forums cover baby loss, multiple pregnancy, common pregnancy ailments and

Daisy focuses on how the woman feels, whether she chooses a natural birth, a planned caesarean section or wants to use pain relieving medication.

all things baby-related, which allows mums and mums-to-be to support each other.

Birthing classes are just a small part of what The Daisy Foundation has to offer women and their birthing partners.

Kayleigh says "Having had two positive, active births myself, I love that Daisy Birthing classes help educate women about having their own positive birth experience."
