CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Permit me, if you will, to look back at two events that have taken place recently. The first was the Judging for Britain in Bloom, when the judges visit our village and take a tour round to see all the hard work put in by the volunteers to make the village nice to live in. I had the privilege of working alongside them in preparing the grassed areas on the main roads into and out of Kippax.

On Longdyke Lane we did not have to cut the grass so we did a litter pick from the Welfare up to the traffic lights on Barnsdale Road. This was an eye opener, a full sack of rubbish that had been thrown down or thrown from cars. Ten days later I drove along this stretch of road only to find that it is as bad again; an elderly gentleman who takes his morning constitutional along there remarked "why don't folk take their litter home or use the bins, it makes Kippax look awful".

In some areas I have seen signs saying "you will be prosecuted for throwing litter from vehicles."

However the judging went well despite an attempt to steal the Bee and Beehive (they are on cctv by the way) The results are announced in September.

The other event was the outing to Wentworth Garden Centre organised by the Village Action Group. 46 people had a great day out and were able to purchase plants at cheap prices. The next outing is to Millstones restaurant in November for a 3 course dinner, dancing and entertainment, including coach travel for the price of £27. Now let's look forward: the long awaited skate park should be completed and the official opening date is September 16th on the playing fields at Kippax Common from 1pm to 5.00pm. Access is via Green Avenue.

There will be bouncy castles, Zorb balls, tiny tots' castles, and other things to keep the children busy; we are trying to arrange pro skaters to give demonstrations and advice on skateboarding during the afternoon.

Also, in November is the switch on of the Christmas lights, the 23rd to be exact. This is the 28th year of Christmas lights in Kippax (correct me if I am wrong but this is the earliest date we can find) Each year we try to improve the show and this year we are hoping to have Danny Milo to compere the show along with Santa, JT from Cas Tigers, Bare Brass and a host of local talent; also the fireworks display This year we have 10 stalls to offer to various groups, ring Gail or myself if you would like one. There is no charge to have a stall but they will be allocated on a first come first served basis.

That's it for now; hope to see you at the forthcoming events.

BRIGSHAW NEWS STORY

Elle Anderson, a Yr 13 pupil who attended Brigshaw High school at the time, choreographed a piece for some KS3 pupils at the school, to perform at the GREAT BIG DANCE OFF regional heats in Halifax back in Feb 2017. The crew won those heats outright and went through to the National Finals in Wellingborough in July 2017 and were placed 1st out of 30 schools from across the country. They scored a whopping 288 points out of a possible 300. The crew consisted of 6yr old Lola Gatley, from Kippax North primary school, which is closely linked through the Brigshaw Learning Partnership, and she played a little girl who lost her deady in the 9/11 attacks in New York. The dancers who performed with such elegance and played out her story, were Emily Bootland, Leah Johnson, Leah Teate, Annie Knight, Poppy Wood, Kayleigh Goddard, Ellie Birch, Erris Swinson and were accompanied by Ella Norman and Chice Goddard who played vital parts of the young girl's life growing up, with a very emotional voice over, highlighting the daily struggle, grief and sorrow feit by tens of thousands of victims of tenorist attacks all over the world.

The piece was originally an emotional 9/11 tribute piece but was performed at the national final as 'one love 9/11' in light of recent events in Manchester, and as we had pupils at Brigshaw who were at that Arianna Grande concert that fatal night.

The piece was performed to perfection, with such sensitivity and maturity, and was full of real emotion. There wasn't a dry eye in the house and they received a standing ovation. The girls were outstanding and truly deserved to be crowned the UK schools dance champions 2017.

All witnessed and supported by their totally committed teachers Mrs Beardshall, Mrs Gaitley, Miss Petty and Mrs Anderson who all had a tear in their eye as Brigshaw were announced the winners!!!!



Mrs Beardshall who has organised the competitions and second in charge of P.E has stated

"I am extremely proud of all of our pupils and this is the biggest achievement our school has had in terms of P.E and sport in the 4 years I have been at Brigshaw. To be able to say we are the best in the country is fantastic for our pupils and most definitely one of the highlights of my career so far. The Dance was net only technically perfect but it had so much meaning behind it. The audience on the night was so moved when our pupils performed, they were reduced to tears and it is a moment I will never forget. I would like to take the opportunity to say well done again to our pupils and for all of the hard work Elle Anderson has put into this group. We are already working on our piece for next year"

RHS Chelsea Flower Show 2017

You know what it's like. You've had something on your bucket list for years and not managed to do it. The closest I had got to the Chelsea Flower Show was watching the 15 programmes a year the BBC produce in covering it. I've been to other flower shows but Chelsea is the most prestigious of all

Well this year, I made it happen, traveling down the day before so I could be at the Show as close as possible to the opening time of 8 o clock. Crowds quickly built up and when they did, it was hard work to get close to the gardens in order to look at them and take some

photos. Most gardens could only be viewed from autside, unlike TV coverage where the cameras gainside thom.

The biggest and most expensive to build gardens are called Show gardens and whilst there were 17 last year, this was reduced to 9 this, as it was horder to find sponsors. Sign of the times I think. Other categories of garden were Artisan, Feel Good and Fresh, which al lock to appeal to different espects of horticulture.



The Great Pavilion covers nearly 3 acres and includes exhibits from



many nurseries and florists. The grounds also include trade stands and a Floral Design Studie Bearing is mind most of the exhibitors have only around 3 weeks on site to build, it was astorishing how established all the gardens and stands looked. Our horticulturists and constructors are excellent and should be congratulated. I did look at some of the prices particularly some of the sculptures and boy, most were out of my price range. I did buy a RHS fold up brolly as a souvenir and this was much more suited to my budgel.

All floral exhibitions and nurseries have the chance to win RHS mediats. The best are given Gold, and then there's Silver-gilt, Silver and Bronze. If it's below Bronze, they get nothing. In any category, there's no limit how many of any medial may be awarded; they could all win Gold, if they must the set criteria.

I admire exhibitors as they have to make sure that their flowers and vegetables are seen at their peak during Show time. Often holding flowers back or bringing them on earlier than

they would normally be seen and it's the culmination for many of 11 months of hard work.





Jobs for the months ahead

September – Keep deadheading perennials such as dahlias in order to keep them flowering. You can divide perennials such as

phlox and hardy geraniums to make new plants. Plant autumn onion sets for early cropping next year. Dig up the last of the potatoes before they are struck by late blight or slugs. Put out 'wet' dog or cat food or bespoke foods for any young hedgehogs that may be still active.

October – Collect ripe seeds once the heads have turned brown and once dried, keep them ideally in an airtight container in the fridge. Plant up prepared hyacinth bulbs and place in a shady cool place for Christmas flowering. Plant garlic as it needs a period of cold to help the cloves develop into next year's bulbs. Make leaf ples for hibernating mammals. Let some wy mature and set flowers as it's a brilliant source of late nectar and berries.

November – Plant tulps for flowers in the spring. Don't tread on frosty or wet lawns. Once foliage has yellowed, bring in at risk plants such as cannas and dahlas, keeping tubers free from frost. Up until early March, prune pear and apple trees. There's still the chance to sow broad beans but protect young plants if there is a period of snow or frost.

Pot pouri

After some recent landscaping changes to my garden, I was locking for a modest sculpture to put in it. At a reasonable price, I bought a metal flower head 9 inches across, which was wrapped up in a bag and a 5 foot metal pole to put it on. Coming back from Chelsea, I was at Kings Cross waiting for the train. Sat on a seat holding out the pole, a lady came and sat beside me with a similar flower but with the flower head in place on the pole. She looked across at mine and said 'petals fallen off yours then?'

Straight to the canteen for coffee and cake (yes canteen 1940) style), then wandered around enjoying the history posted in the Nissam Huts. It's over a year since Kippax Library renovations were completed and the one stop shop moved in to the new Kippax Community Hub with improved hours and facilities. Kippax Community Hub is central to our village and offers Council Services such as library, customer service and self-serve job shop. Did you know many council services can be accessed via our self-serve online system which is available in the Hub? We also have a free phone available where you can speak directly to council services; the phone is situated on the top floor near the lift.

Whenever Online Services are mentioned people vary in their reaction - some prefer the convenience of organising their lives online, some prefer other ways to organise their lives and services required, and some of us have fear or are just apprehensive. One certainty is all our lives are changing with this technology from the way we work to shopping and services we require and everything increasingly needs some input from us online. Here at the Hub we can help and it's free! Do you need help or want to improve your computer skills? Our popular one to one sessions are available. You can use one of the computers at the Hub for the session or you can bring your own tablet/laptop from home.

Need a place to work with free Wifi access? Need some desk space to organise your workload? Want to bring your own laptop? Pop in to use our work stations and tables, and if you need the use of a PC they are available with free internet access and connection to our printers.

The printer/photocopier incurs charges: for printing it is 20p per A4 copy, photocopying facilities include both A3 and A4 in black & white or colour. Charges for this are A4 black/ white 10p, colour 20p per copy and A3 black/white 20p and colour 40p per copy.

Are you looking for space to meet up as a Community group or with friends? It may just be adhoc or on a regular basis. Why not call and have a chat to see what space is available and what we can provide in your local Community Hub?

Recently two young ladies from Brigshaw High School approached the Hub to organise a new Children's book group, so why not come and join them here. GARDEN HINTS

My latest task has been an assignment in the recovery of a garden. Not touched for many years it contains some superb trees and shrubs: many interesting specimens. It is very much overgrown. If you had been to The Lost Gardens of Heligan in Cornwall at the beginning of their development you would know what I mean. It is now in the middle of its third decade of development. Getting to grips with this sort of garden is exciting! Identifying the good bad and the ugly takes time. In the same instance it is necessary to protect these trees and shrub species retained and show them to their best advantage. The mix with the additional layer of perennial weeds and climbers makes it doubly difficult in the task. In the final event you should try and achieve a garden landscape which reflects what was there originally. There is also the bid to keep any future maintenance to the absolute minimum.

Adjacent gardens require to be protected and a chat with the neighbours on all sides is essential. Perennial weeds will never be eliminated completely so careful cultivation and the careful use of total herbicides is compulsory. Leaving the area's fallow as they are recovered is also a requirement to identify any potential weed growth which will threaten future planting and that which exists at present.

It is disconcerting to see a virtual forest stripped back to the bare bones as with Heligan. Underneath all that undergrowth is a structure of original plants which need to be laid bare, weed growth eliminated and new planting considered. Four days' work has filled a tractor-trailer and there is much more to come. Hedges are inundated with bramble and ivy needing dug out and the hedges cut back, the objective being to let in the light to encourage fresh growth. A real challenge really and a brave stance needed by the renovator. Some plants, of course, will have gone past their best and a decision is required for their complete removal. Letting in light is important as plants will not recover unless they get back to growing leaf and photosynthesizing.

It is also an opportunity to see mature plants used as support for others. Three apple trees in my own garden support Clematis montana 'Elizabeth', a sheet of colour in flower. Cleared areas present opportunities for planting the species that you like (the client). It's a bit of SWOT management dropped into the process finding strengths (S), weaknesses (W), opportunities (O) and threats (T). In this case bindweed and shade are real threats.

The abundance of small pools gives an opportunity for encouraging wildlife. So far we have come across two newts and three frogs. I am sure I have missed many others. There will be a lot more hopefully and I continue to keep a look out for the odd toad. Funnily enough you cannot move these creatures from one location to another. They will always try to get back to their birth place. It is more likely they will stay in one place if you transport the eggs and spawn. I am hoping for Dragonflies and Damsel flies and some thought will have to be given to not only plants on the land but those in the water, water mint and yellow iris? There is nothing so exciting for children to see nature close up and to have your own dipping pond for your grandchildren is an opportunity not to be missed!

The Blacksmith's Forge

With regard to the piece in the June issue of Kippax Matters about the Blacksmith's Forge, there seems to be some confusion about the details.

I have been asked by the people who clearly remember those times, around 1930's, to put the records straight. So I write on their behalf.

My close relatives and friend aged 93,88 and 92 respectively clearly remember where the only blacksmith's forge in Kippax was, and sadly it was not in the area off the High Street described as 'Hick's Yard' between Goodall's Bakery and Advantage Mortgage Services.

It is recalled that Hick's Yard was in fact on the Crosshills area of High Street which is now the beautiful garden. Facing the Crosshills roundabout were two shops. You may remember them as Butterfield's Greengrocers or, further back in time, the Gas Showrooms and the Library. To the left of those properties was a dirt track which led to the yard behind the building known as 'Hick's Yard'. This housed the Blacksmith's Forge. The Blacksmith was Mr Gosling.

My father worked for Gough's Grocers which was situated in a stone property in the area which is now the access road to the car park next to Central Fisheries. Deliveries in those days were made by horse and cart. It was his job to take the horses to be re-shod to Mr Gosling the Blacksmith. Incidentally, the stables for those horses were in the building which now houses Bargain Booze on Crosshills. If you look at the building from Butt Hill you can see the arched structures which are now bricked in.

Another relative can clearly remember calling to watch the blacksmith on his way home from school. Apparently it was great fun for him and his pals to catch the sparks from the forge! The school is now demolished and was situated on the land surrounded by railings opposite the Kippax Community Hub.

Wouldn't it be lovely if we could record the stories of our relatives and friends who can remember those times with affection, to paint the picture of our history for us all today? Those memories are too valuable to lose!

Many thanks for your article about the village blacksmiths of Kippax. And I agree that Mr Gosling was the blacksmith just off Cross Hills, however that is not all of the story and I have put together a summary of the Hick/Gosling era

Kippax Blacksmiths

Following the comments about the former blacksmith's shop off High Street a little research revealed that two families provided blacksmiths for Kippax for over 100 years.

Thomas Hick who died in 1819 is recorded as blacksmith on his gravestone and it seems reasonable to assume the business was passed down the family as the same surname occurs in the Trade Directories (Yellow Pages /Internet of the 19th C) of the period.

In the middle of the century there were two blacksmiths Thomas & William Hick so possibly two premises John Hick is the last to be recorded in 1901.

From 1904 William Gosling is blacksmith, still trading in 1936

Unfortunately no locations of premises are given in Trade Directories but my understanding is that Mr Gosling used the premises off Cross Hills so by association it seems likely that Hicks or at least one of them used the one off High Street.
