#### A VIEW FROM A KIPPAX GARDEN by EBG Jardinero

#### What a weird one

Well, so far this year, it's been a challenging time for all things gardening. After the wet of spring and a dry summer, at last we returned to having bursts of rain, although with numerous strong winds.

I didn't cut the lawns during the hottest spell but I've cut them a couple of times since we've started to have some rain, albeit with a high level of cut. The accepted view is not to waste good water on lawns in dry spells as they will always come back into growth. Well mine have improved but they still have some decent size brown patches. A couple of weeks ago I cracked and after raking it all over with a lawn tine rake and taking off lots of dead grass for the compost heap, I spread grass seed on the patches. They haven't done much so may need another go before it gets too cold; I'll try again in spring if needed.

During the dry spell, the water in my 4 water butts was emptied and so last week, I added a 200 litre one to increase capacity. It's likely that before winter is out, I'll get at least one more. A recent trip to the Washburn valley to the north of Otley, showed that the reservoirs there need a lot more rain to fill them up.

More plants have been lost to the dry weather and some such as a Lonicera (shrubby honeysuckle) had got too leggy. Trips to local garden centres and the Harrogate Autumn Flower Show, have broadened the range of plants to renovate the borders with. For the Show, too often I go plant shopping with no plan but this time I had one. I took some cash with me and bought plants until I couldn't carry any more and had run out of money! Before planting, I weeded the borders thoroughly and it took a while, but it will be well worth it in the long term.

A number of vegetables were sown in October to give some earlier crops next year. Broad beans and peas were soaked until they were looking plump and then potted up. They will remain in an unheated greenhouse until conditions are right to put them out in the veg. bed; the beans could stay out over winter and the peas will be planted out in early spring. Garlic bulbs have been split into cloves and they have been individually planted an inch below soil level directly into a bed outside. They need a period of cold to enable each clove to split into a number of cloves that will form a bulb, when they have grown.

There have been some fantastic autumn colours in the past couple of weeks and despite strong winds, at the time of writing not all leaves have fallen off the trees. I have a purple leaved Acer in a pot and late one day last week I noticed the leaves were a vivid scarlet. I

intended to take some pictures of it the next day. 40mph winds overnight left the tree with two leaves on it and the photo opportunity was lost; for 12 months at least. Carpe diem.

Tomato update - as in previous years I grew 6 red fruited (Tomato 'Gardener's Delight') and one of yellow (T. 'Golden Crown') in large pots in the greenhouse. Yields and taste were great for the yellow and poor for the red. Next year I'm going to really shake the tree and will go for 6 yellows and one other; beefsteak, striped, purple? The world's my tomato.

#### Potpourri

In the front, there is a bed that is 5.2 metres (17 ft) long by 2.1 m (7 ft) deep. It has a brick wall behind it, a low wall on the other 3 sides and it stands in a sea of paving. It recently got a sort out as the phormiums in there had got too big and a larch, that had been put in small, was struggling. I wanted to restrict it to fit the space but it wanted to be a forest tree. Another tree, a Japanese Cedar has a nice cone shape, but is 1.8m (6 ft) high and I want to reduce the height of it. This will wait until after autumn when the green leaves have turned a lovely bronze colour and I would lose the effect.

As I worked away, I realised how poor the bed was for wildlife. Leaves landed on it and weren't breaking down. I didn't come across a single worm when digging. I had only

occasionally improved the soil over the last decade. There was little cover for insects or birds and it got really warm being surrounded by paving. So, I've put more flowering shrubs in there such as sedum, hebe and Japanese anenomes, thinned out the phormiums and improved the soil. I replaced the larch with a crab apple which will give me spring flowers, red crab apples at the end of summer and hopefully some colourful autumn leaves. I originally put the crab apple in the bed guite close to the back wall but then moved it away so I could get a pyracantha between it and the wall. The pyracantha will grow along the wall cooling it down as the wall won't get as much sun on it and it will provide habitat, protected by its thorns. Plus. I'll get spring flowers and berries for me to see and birds to eat. I've put in two bird nest boxes and will get some insect hotels as well. A pile of logs on the ground at the back will also improve the habitat for wildlife. We'll see how it all grows.

#### Jobs for the months ahead

**December** – In mild weather, if they need it, give lawns a cut to 2-4cm ( $\frac{3}{4}$  to 1  $\frac{1}{2}$  in). There's still time to plant garlic in well-drained soil or pots.

**January** – Stand on planks when working in borders as it reduces compaction. Clear out and clean bird boxes. Open cold frames and doors of greenhouses if the day is mild, to improve air circulation and reduce risk of grey mould.

**February** – Cut back late summer- and autumn flowering (Group 3) Clematis to 30cm (12in) from the ground. Continue feeding birds but clean underneath the feeders regularly to put off visits by rodents.

Doug was very much the leading light in many of the village's achievements since his days on the forum. His enthusiasm and passion for Kippax will be missed. Thank you, Doug for everything you have done for our village and all who live in it.

As Christmas approaches, we look back over the past few months, at some of the good highlights.

The visit of the Tour de Yorkshire saw not only a great turnout by the village, with 3,000 metres of bunting, 2,500 hand flags, 2,000 balloons, 60 large flags and 18 painted bikes spread throughout the village, but also great land art projects all of which led to Kippax winning the best dressed village award. You may have noticed as well that the pig on the wall has been given a refresh!

Doug was an active member of the Kippax community for most of his life, from working with the youth of the village to becoming Chair of Kippax Parish Council. Along the way he was a Lion, a Santa Claus and a friend to many people.

Initially he was involved with several other people in the Kippax Community Environment Forum (KCEF) in 2001. Doug joined in 2003. Following on from this was the formation of the Parish Council in 2004, and he became Chairman in 2011.

Doug always referred to the views of the villagers, gleaned from various questionnaires published in documents such as the Village Design Statement, the Parish Plan and the forthcoming Neighbourhood Plan.

He was always concerned with the needs of the Youth and how they saw the future of their village and he was determined the village would get a Skatepark!

He was a good friend to me, he let me have my own and this I liked! I could ring him or call round and he would help me with whatever mad ideas I had.

He liked a cuddle too, and that is what I will miss the most, our cuddles.

When he got ill he took me to one side to tell me because we had a strong friendship based on respect, and I will forever respect Doug and what he stood for.

No one will take his place in my heart or within the village.

The village of Kippax will be in his debt forever, and it is a much better place for him being in it. RIP my lovely friend.

#### DOUG

Just a bit of back ground. We go back many, many years as family friends. My mum and dad went on holiday with Doug and Margaret, the Morley family make up was very much like mine 3 girls one boy so whatever we did we always ended up one way or another with a Morley and Simpson line up (before we all got married and changed our surnames)

As families we have all worked together over the years for the good of the uniformed organisations (Cubs, Scouts. Brownies and Guides) and of course Kippax. Someone put on Facebook recently Mr. Kippax referring to Doug, and that's right, Kippax has always been a focus for him.

Doug and I along with Colin Child (now our Parish Clerk) and many others started Kippax Forum in 2001. Kippax in Bloom was born and the first entry to Yorkshire in Bloom was 2002 and from there on in it has been success all the way with Doug and Derrick riding the grass cutter to make the grassed areas of the village more presentable than other Villages. Pat Samy and her team planting away. The forum soon discovered that we needed a lot of money to improve services and areas of our village. Moving over to form a Parish Council was the next step, having to get a percentage of the village to agree to it before any progress could be made, so lots of weeks stood in the KOOP (as Ron Shaw would say) canvasing people for their commitment to a Parish Council began.

On the 17th June 2004 the first every Parish Council meeting was held and Derrick Morgan was voted in as Chairman of the council. Unfortunately, due to ill health Derrick stood down in May 2011 and in September 2011 Doug took on the Role of Chairman of the Parish Council which he undertook with even more passion than his early years in the forum. There were not many groups in Kippax that he didn't know something about or how to find things out.

Back in 2005 when the Parish Council was finding its feet we asked the residents of Kippax what they wanted us to do in the Village. Questionnaires were sent to every household. From this we drew up a list of projects that we could get our teeth into, to the people of Kippax we meant business. I know that Doug always kept this list in his black leather folder and at times we would get it out and review things. The list had 24 things on it and I can tell you as at today, 17 of them have been completed or nearly as the road crossing scheme outside Cross Hill Court is nearly there! and the Big one was the Skate Board Park (or in today's terms a wheeled facility) opened last year.

We also have to admit occasional defeat and lost the Old School Building which we wanted for a large community building to be known as the Arc. We also wanted a Village Square, which over the last 15 years we can never seem to get out of the starting blocks. But who knows if we keep chipping away.

Doug worked tirelessly on all the projects we did, and was not afraid to get his hands dirty or let people know what he thought. He worked on projects right to the end, checked that Francis and I had got things sorted for the Christmas lights switch on which he had to delegate due to his illness.

This little bit of potted history of the Council does not do justice to the work Doug did. The Parish Council will go on, but he will be a hard act to follow for all the time, energy and commitment he gave to improving Kippax for everyone.

Dear Kippax Matters.

I recently saw a film at Allerton Bywater entitled 'Living With Fracking'. It was filmed and presented by a couple from Kirby Misperton, North Yorkshire. They had had conflicting messages about fracking and so they travelled to Pennsylvania, to see for themselves and film what it means to have fracking on your doorstep.

The film was an eye-opener....

The state of Pennsylvania is only a bit smaller than England. But its population is much smaller (roughly 10 million as opposed to our 54 million). So it was hoped originally that a few drilling sites could be hidden in vast swathes of woodland.

As they toured around, it was clear that the wells were very much in evidence. A well pad is dug down deep into the earth but the fracking occurs in the wells that are dug out horizontally beneath the ground Millions of gallons of water mixed with sand and chemicals (some carcinogenic) are pumped at high pressure into the well so that the shale splits and gas is forced out which can then be pumped to the surface,

Once a well has been fracked it is redundant and new fracking wells must be built in order to continue fracking, The Pennsylvania residents interviewed said they had had no idea of the extent of the fracking before it started.

Many were involved in legal battles with the fracking companies as the wells had ruined their farms and polluted water supplies.

One of the most shocking images from the film was of the 'dead' wells. After the fracking companies had left, old wells sometimes erupted causing explosive burning fires

Problems occurred also when fracking came 'up close; to areas of higher population, Chemical contaminants in the air and water have had abnormally high adverse health effects in children and adults in those communities

Like the UK, Pennsylvanians had been promised 'gold standard' Industry safeguards and were not warned that this devastation would happen.
