

FRACK FREE ALLERTON BYWATER & SURROUNDING AREAS

Local residents concerned about potential fracking in our locality have formed the Frack Free Allerton Bywater and Surrounding Areas Campaign Group because the extraction of shale gas could commence in a wide area that stretches from Belle Isle, Great Preston and Ledsham on its northern edge to Wakefield, Featherstone and Pontefract on the southern edge. To the West it includes Outwood and to the East it includes Knottingley.

As you may already be aware this wide area has been identified as a potential for the extraction of shale gas. But did you know that new government guidelines exploratory work could be carried out with no requirement for planning permission and therefore no option for the community to voice their concerns/objections regarding this? This is of particular concern because, as you know, Fracking should not be taking place in former mining areas such as Kippax or nearby as there is a strong possibility that existing subsidence will be made worse.

In addition they are very concerned about proposals that Knostrop sewage works is to be used to handle flow-back waste from various existing Fracking sites in Lancashire and North Yorkshire plus others across the north of England. The processing flow-back waste produces highly toxic material and radioactivity that will be discharged into the River Aire.

If you support the 3 objectives of the Frack Free Allerton Bywater & Surrounding Areas campaign group;

- 1. To oppose Fracking licences issued by the Government within this locality. PEDL licence 275 granted to Hutton Energy and PEDL licence 37 granted to Alkane Energy.
- 2. To oppose the Government treating Fracking as Permitted Development rather than requiring planning permission, particularly in former mining areas, and the subsequent removal of our right to discuss applications.
- 3. To oppose the proposed use of Knostrop Sewage Works in Leeds for the treatment of fracking flow-back waste water from sites across the north of England and the Midlands before being released into the River Aire.

A VIEW FROM A KIPPAX GARDEN by EBG Jardinero

It's near the end of January and I don't remember too much recent rain but we have had a few frosty mornings; no snow as yet. As you would expect, growth is largely in pause mode but we are beginning to see some here and there. In recent weeks bulbs are starting to peek through the soil. Snowdrops and daffodils are leading the charge along with buttervellow flowered winter aconite and miniature iris. Iris 'Lady Beatrix Stanley' is lovely with violet blue flowers and grows 10cm high. Much of my efforts over winter has turned to trees and shrubs that had outgrown their space and getting them pruned whilst they are dormant. 6 years ago. I was given 3 Holm Oak saplings that were no longer than 15 inches high and I put them in a border alongside a flowering red current and a twisted hazel. All have grown excessively and as they weren't doing each other any favours, they have been coppiced which means they have been cut down low to the ground. In adjoining beds, I made inroads into areas that had been previously overlooked and had yet to be tended. This meant more cutting out of overgrown elderberry and cotoneaster. Whilst this part of the garden is on a south facing slope, it does have a conifer with golden foliage nearby blocking out direct sun. It's an opportunity to put in some shade tolerant plants. I've split plants from elsewhere in the garden including ferns, drumstick primulas and Epimediums to put there and have a pot of bluebell bulbs to go in. The latter weren't taken from the wild but were bought from a nursery using cultivated stock. I've bought a Geranium 'Miss Heidi' which has pink/darker veined flowers and grows to 40cm. I reckon I can split it into 3 clumps which will bulk it up in the ground and make a better display. A great favourite are trilliums and whilst they've not had the best of success in the beds near the house, I'm hoping they will take off with a bit more shade.

Of the resulting cut down woody material, I'm doing one of three things to it depending on its width. The thinnest is being cut up fine and will be mixed into my compost bin. I recently had a delivery of wood chips for the veg. bed paths but was running out before they were all covered. So, the mid-size material I will chop up and spread on the uncovered paths. I've kept a couple of bags back of the delivered chips and will sprinkle this over the stuff I've cut up, making the paths look a bit more uniform. We'll see what it looks like when I've done. The thickest prunings have been cut up lengthwise and will be put on log piles around the garden, but if any are surplus, they'll be going to the local Council tip for recycling.

It's taking a lot of effort and someone might say 'get a

mechanical chipper machine' but I don't want one. It's been a joy to be visited by a robin whilst I've been weeding and doing the tidying. It comes to within a couple of feet and dashes in sharpish to tuck into any insects that become exposed; keeping a beady eye on me as if I'm competition for what it's scooping up. Near where I was working, I was overwhelmed by heady scent that early spring brings forth from some Christmas box plants (Sarcoccoca). The same bed has a couple of witch hazels in them and it won't be long before the flowers release their own spicy scent.

The veg. beds have been weeded but they are infested with bindweed which loses top growth over winter, only to re-emerge in spring from rhizomes (underground stems). broken bits can develop new plants so it's hard work fully getting rid of it and it's a climber using any plants near it to gain height. It's radical, but I'm considering not growing anything in the beds this year and see if I can get control.

Elsewhere, the lawns have improved from the worst of the drought last year but parts of them still look like they've been ploughed. There was some scruffy patchy growth on them so on 13 January I gave them a high trim as it wasn't frosty and it was dry enough. From the house, they look heaps better, because I did the edges which is half the

battle. I believe they will improve over coming weeks if it warms up and we get some rain. The seed I put down in autumn has taken but needs to bulk up to fill the gaps. I'll seed again if required. I've had lots of cuttings in pots in the garden over winter and I spent a couple of hours in mid-January removing leaves that had blown onto them, taking out weeds and topping up soil where it was low. Much healthier for the plants and they actually look a lot better as well. In coming weeks, I'll continue weeding in borders and the greenhouse will have its annual clean, both inside and out. I'll also be planning what seeds I need so I can go and get them and not get too many impulse buys. I'll look at what I've got left over from last year beforehand and dispose of any that are too old.

Jobs for the months ahead

March – Annual herbs can be sown under cover, along with cucumbers, carrots, peppers, peas and lettuce. Divide perennials that flower in summer and need it, before new growth appears. Put out specialist hedgehog or dog food out for hogs emerging from hibernation; don't give them bread and milk.

April – Sow annuals that prefer direct sowing this month; check the seed packet instructions. Sow under glass crops such as pumpkins and runner beans to plant out after last frosts next month.

May – If sweet pea shoots make a bid for freedom, tie them into their supports. Pinch out mint and lemon balm shoots to prevent flowering and promote bushiness. Sow basil in succession to add to pesto or tomato dishes.

After Christmas has been and gone, I always feel uplifted when days get longer and we start to see signs of spring, with shoots bursting forth and wildlife becoming more active again.




KIPPAX WOMENS INSTITUTE

KIPPAX DRAMATIC SOCIETY


As part of the village's Armistice Centenary Commemoration last November, our society presented a specially adapted Murder Mystery entitled 'An Invitation to Remember'.

KIPPAX IN BLOOM

As I write, we have just welcomed in the New Year so I suppose that one of our hopes for 2019 is that we can be as successful as we have been in the past to benefit all that live, work and visit Kippax. All our volunteers will continue to work hard every week of the year and we will be entering Kippax in Yorkshire in Bloom again this year.

November of last year saw the marking of the centenary of the First World War Armistice. KIB planted polyanthus in red and blue in beds along the High Street and the entrance stones – red to remember those men who gave their lives and blue for the animals. We planted skimmia, heathers, cyclamen and pansies in our planters for some winter colour. We also planted daffodils around the Moorgate shops and Pub that have been sponsored by our grass-cutting contractor, Continental. New crocus bulbs will be appearing on Butt Hill, sponsored by Groundwork. Mixed bulbs were planted in borders at Gibson Lane Community Centre and Crosshills Court sponsored by a local couple as they do every year. Clearly, we are extremely grateful for these contributions. As this Parish Magazine is delivered to you these bulbs will be showing their lovely heads.

We were again reminded of the importance of community involvement for "in-Bloom" with the announcement that the Tour de Yorkshire will again be riding through the village so we will be planting blue and yellow again. Kippax looked amazing last year and the way in which the whole community came together was so impressive. We will continue with our Litter Picks so look out for dates in our notice boards and on social media.

Pat has had quite a few residents express their concern about our fabulous bee being left out over winter down at the Moorgate. I'm afraid we have no choice in this as Layla from Dragon Willow who helped us make it says it will fall to bits if we move it and it cannot be repaired again.

Whilst we have increased the number of volunteers, we always need more so please can you help in any way, you do not need gardening experience. We hope some of you can join us to continue improving our environment. Also, can anyone help with the Kippax North School garden. They won a gold medal last year so any assistance would be most welcome. We now have three Duke of Edinburgh Award students working with us which is very good.

KIPPAX KICKS

Kippax and Methley ward councillors James Lewis, Mary Harland and Keith Wakefield have welcomed the launch of 'Kippax Kicks'; the new football coaching programme for children aged 10 to 17 years. 'Kippax Kicks' is organised by Leeds Youth Service in partnership with the Leeds United Foundation and provides football coaching sessions at Kippax Leisure Centre sports hall every Monday evening.

The programme, led by qualified football coach and two youth workers, aims to improve young people's fitness, teach new skills as well as provide younger residents with a safe space to





make new friends and socialise. Youth workers are also on hand to discuss any issues that may affect young people and to signpost young people to other agencies who can provide support.

The launch of 'Kippax Kicks' follows consultation with young people from Kippax and the surrounding villages and builds on the success of the city-wide 'Kicks' programme which has proved highly popular in other areas of Leeds.

The new programme has been possible thanks to the generous contribution from Kippax and Methley ward councillors who agreed to fund the Kippax Leisure Centre hire costs over the three-month trial, with funding secured from Kippax Parish Council to support any future hire costs.

Councillors James Lewis, Mary Harland and Keith Wakefield (Labour, Kippax & Methley) said: "We're thrilled to support the new Kippax Kicks sessions at Kippax Leisure Centre which provides a safe and welcoming environment for girls and boys of all backgrounds and abilities to get involved in sport.

Football is a fantastic way for our younger residents to make new friends, let off steam and gain confidence all the while helping them stay fit and healthy. During the sessions, we also have a couple of dedicated youth workers on hand ready to discuss any issues affecting young people who can signpost them to other agencies they may find useful.

We heartily recommend all those between 10 and 17 years in the area to give Kippax Kicks a try and join in the fun."

Premier League KICKS Project Officer at Leeds United Foundation, Joe Scargill, added: "Sport and football in particular is a very powerful tool that can break down barriers, reach out to young people and provide a pathway towards something positive.

Promoting good wellbeing, reinforcing values and offering personal development routes are what we aspire towards providing for the young people we work with; football acts as a brilliant means of doing this.

Denise and her team supported by Jordan, our LUF coach have managed to create a fantastic environment for young people to safely engage in positive activities in such a short space of time and the support from Councillors Lewis, Wakefield and Harland has been pivotal to its growth.Sessions are held every Monday at Kippax Leisure Centre Sports Hall between 4:45 - 5:45pm for 10-13yrs and 5:45 - 6:45pm for 14-17yrs. 50p per session. Just turn up at the session and complete a short registration form.
