

SUMMERTIME WITH THE LOWER AIRE VALLEY VOLUNTEERS

What a busy season it has been working with the Lower Aire Valley Volunteers managing our local nature reserves. We manage 10 nature reserves in the area: Townclose Hills, The Lines Way, Kippax Meadows, Owl Wood and Pit Plantation, Hollinhurst Wood, Rothwell Country Park, Rothwell pastures, Waterhaigh Woodland Park, Ledston Luck and Letchmire Pastures. This summer we have been working especially hard pulling the plant Himalayan balsam which is an invasive non-native species that spreads very quickly and outcompetes our native flora. You will often see it along water courses and it has shallow roots, a hollow stem and purple flowers. Unfortunately, we have it on many of our nature reserves in the Lower Aire Valley but the volunteers have been fantastic and worked tirelessly pulling it out and clearing large areas. Our reward for all this hard work is how beautiful the sites look during the summer. Townclose Hills aka Billy Woods looked spectacular this summer with plenty of orchids, yellow rattle, clustered bellflower, knapweed and field scabious (to mention but a few) in full bloom. This special grassland attracts the marbled white butterfly which is a beautiful black and white butterfly that specialises on chalky/ magnesian limestone meadows. Another star animal we have on site is the glow worm (which is in fact a beetle) and this year saw one of the best years for glow worms with over 30 females glowing on one night - it was absolutely magical! Without the careful management of these meadows and woodlands by Yorkshire Wildlife Trust and the brilliant Lower Aire Valley Volunteers these sites would not be as fantastic for wildlife. We run volunteer days every Tuesday and Friday, and rove around the different sites. Tasks can include anything from litter picking, building steps, cutting down or planting trees, pulling undesirable plants and the list goes on. No previous experience is needed, just a willingness to get stuck in! 



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KIPPAX IN BLOOM

If only the different timetables for different aspects of Kippax life could be in sync! This article is being penned shortly after the Yorkshire in Bloom judges visited and embarked on their tour of the village in mid July. Of course, you will not be reading this until a further two months down the line. Moreover, as the results won't be known until the 10th of September during a ceremony at York Racecourse, it will be the December edition of this magazine when you will read about it. What we can report is how brilliantly Judging Day went. The comments of the two judges following their tour were extremely positive. They congratulated and thanked everyone in the Kippax Community for the very high standard and pride shown on their visit and they praised the efforts of all involved, commenting that clearly an awful lot of hard work had gone into making Kippax look good. One of the judges had visited five years ago and was very impressed by the tremendous progress made, the obvious sense of teamwork and the elements of community support from the residents of Kippax clearly evident. This is an issue which seems to increase remarkably year on year. It is evidenced in the quality of residents' gardens, the displaying of posters on judging day and generally the comments received by the volunteers throughout the year, and not forgetting the supportive observations made on Facebook.

Furthermore, we must give a big thank you to the Moorgate for their continued support; their welcoming of the judges and the KIB mob is very much appreciated. I would also like to mention the Growing Zone which again showcased their outstanding work.



KIPPAX COMMEMORATION EVENT FOR THE 75TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE END OF WORLD WAR 2

Next year there will be national celebrations to commemorate the 75^{th} Anniversary of the end of WW2 and the coming of peace. The Kippax Commemoration Event Group, in conjunction with the Parish Council, is planning a special weekend in the village to commemorate the peace and those who served in any way.

The event will take place on the weekend of June 13th and 14th, 2020 with an additional day for schools on Monday June 15th. This date has been selected as being part way between VE and VJ days, and not in school holiday periods. Indoor events in St. Mary's Church and Hall, and Kippax Methodist Church will include exhibitions of research into those people from Kippax and the locality who served in any way, in the forces or on the Home front. As in previous events, relatives of anyone currently living in Kippax can also be included in the commemorations. There will be supporting information and displays around the topic, produced by local schools and community groups and presentations from dance/drama groups, choirs and schools.

Outdoor events, organised by the Parish Council group, will involve a peace-themed parade on the Saturday morning followed by an an opening ceremony, and a community picnic with commemorative tributes and entertainments on the Sunday afternoon, proposed to be on the Cheney Basin.

An initial list of names of service and home front personnel has already been compiled, and this will be displayed in Kippax One Stop Centre Library area in the two weeks commencing October 14th, 2019 and in the Coop on Friday 17th and Saturday 18th January, 2020. Information from forces websites is not as easy to obtain as it was for WW1 personnel, and family stories and memorabilia will be vital.

M.J.H.PROPERTY MAINTENANCE

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THE VIEW FROM A NORTHERN GARDEN by EBG Jardinero Esq.

In the garden I've watched Gardeners' World on BBC for as many years as I can remember. The episode on 12 July this year had a more profound effect on me than anything I've seen, in terms of gardening going forward. It was a special episode about wildflower gardening; their decline, why they are important and why landowners and gardeners just like us, can make such a difference and help to reverse this deterioration going forward. I thought I was aware of the issues but I'll certainly allow it to influence me in the future. Last September, I sowed a wildflower and grass seed-mix on part of the far reaches of the garden, that I'd cleared of perennial weeds. When the growing season is over and any seeds have fallen on the ground, I'll clear the vegetation. If this is left, grasses will like the increase in fertility more than the wildflowers and then start to outcompete them. This September I'm going to sow some more wildflower seeds into the existing patch and also extend its area from its existing 5x2m. Near the house behind the garage, I'd had my eye on a shrubby honeysuckle in a raised bed which I had previously given a trim. It looked like a set of sticks two foot high with wisps of foliage on the end. Last year. I had another such plant nearer the kitchen window that was clipped into a ball but was two feet across and was too big for the scale of the surrounding plants. I pruned this to two inches high and since then, as it grows, I've been pruning it back. So now it's a tight mass 10cm high and I can keep on top of it and keep it to a much better scale. So given this, last week, the one behind the garage was trimmed further. I couldn't stop there though and three adjacent hebes got the same treatment, being pruned to where there were some little shoots showing. Such severe pruning does have its risks but if they survive, they will be a better shape and I took some cuttings off their tips as an insurance. If the cuttings take and the original plants don't re-shoot, then I have some replacements and at least some more new plants. Once I get those secateurs snipping away, I sometimes find it hard to stop. I've collected a dozen mint plants over several years and a couple of years ago, I put them in separate 15cm terracotta pots so I could display them. These include Eau de Cologne, chocolate peppermint and apple. Previously, the pots were by the side of the greenhouse and weren't growing all that well. I moved them this spring to a low stepped wall in front of the kitchen windows. They're flourishing and I put it down to a combination of more sun and more regular watering. This season, I've bought a Banana mint, Lime mint and a Strawberry mint and these have increased the range. Mints are one of those plants that it's best not to plant them in open ground as they will run and spread far and wide. Vegetables Well I thoroughly expected to give the beds a rest this year and leave them

Vegetables Well I thoroughly expected to give the beds a rest this year and leave them fallow, so I could get to grips with the bindweed in them. I haven't stuck to the plan. The greenhouse looked underused without its usual vegetable seedlings so I potted some up and then planted them out. To be fair, the veg. in the beds are looking good, despite the bindweed. Watering, weeding and feeding of them have been better than in previous years so I've already had some good pickings of Courgette Black Beauty. Sweet Corn Incredible, Beetroot Kestrel, Kale Dwarf Green Curled, Pea Carouby De Maussane and Runner Bean Scarlet Emperor are all looking like they will produce some good harvests. A pair of apple trees have good fruit of them but I was too slow with the cherries and raspberries which provided a splendid feed for the local blackbirds.

The view over the garden wall I looked out from under an umbrella and it was chucking it down. So I went and sought cover in the main marquee but it was heaving being full of people who had had the same idea. Ground water was starting to puddle through the covering on the floor.

This was my first visit to RHS Chatsworth Flower Show and I was determined to enjoy it because I hadn't managed to get to the first two Shows there. I managed to relish being at the Show, with overcoming the weather only heightening the enjoyment. I bought another metal sculpture on a pole (which looks really good in the border now it's been 'planted') and stopped spending money on plants when the cash ran out. Amongst the plants I bought was a Sanguisorba Lilac Squirrel which will be 1m high with terminal spikes of fluffy flowers and





a Cornus canadensis which is a lovely low ground cover 10-15 cm high. The Cornus has similar bracts to a Cornus kousa China Girl which is a small deciduous tree that I bought last year and have in a pot in the back garden. I was one of the last to leave and it certainly became easier to walk around the marquees when others had gone home a little later on. Also, the brolley was a boon because without it, I'd have been soaked to the skin and had to leave earlier. I've been a regular visitor to see the Chatsworth estate and to see the backdrop of the House, with the show in the foreground, was a great scene to take in. With it being a relatively local show for me, I'll be back next year, hopefully with better weather.

STOP PRESS – Last night after hearing a very loud snuffling noise from outside, it was exhilarating to see three hedgehogs working their way round take back garden. In the 12 years in this house, I've only seen single hogs less than a dozen times. Let's hope this is going to be more regular, that it shows that they have adequate access and that the environment is giving them food and shelter. Appreciating the hogs and nature in general. Get out and enjoy a garden.

FIFTY GOLDEN YEARS AT KIPPAX NORTH



Walk

Walk 1, of a series of walks in and around Kippax.

Start: Station Road car park, Gt Preston.

Terrain: mostly flat with firm paths. 2 stiles Length: 4ish miles.



Start the walk on the obvious path, an old railway line, called 'the Linesway' heading away from Gt Preston. Follow this with no deviations, trying to ignore the rubbish as you walk under an old railway bridge! Continue for a mile with no deviations, when crossing a tarmac road, the path is on the other side, slightly to the left.

When the Linesway reaches a road and housing and traffic lights, turn right along the footpath. The old Victorian school on your left. Cross the road and turn into the street to the right of the school, carry on noting the lovely church. Cross the quite busy road and follow it, till you have the Victoria Pub on your left. Spot the public footpath sign on your right, near a metal gate, and pass through a small gate. Walk ahead, up a slight slope, then you will see the river. Bear right up a slope to follow this, climb over a very solid stile, and follow the path with the river on your left. Plenty of wildlife to spot.

When you reach a junction of paths turn right and follow it going over a small wooden bridge and through wood land, very quickly you will gain another crossroads of paths, go straight ahead.

At the next junction turn left, onto a disused railway line, carry on, at the next junction of paths go straight ahead, the path opens up with a view of St Aiden's, turn right and head towards the RSBP visitors centre, for a welcome drink and toilet stop.

When you leave the centre, walk round the carpark, footpath on the left and walk up to the main entrance on Astley Lane. Here turn left and walk along the verge for a few yards, looking out for a public footpath sign on the opposite side of the road. You should see it before you reach a sign on your left.

Cross the road, then climb over a stile with care. The hedge is on your left, and follow the path on the side of the field. When the field ends walk though a small wood to emerge onto a road junction.

Turn left and walk along the footpath, with the village hall (once a chapel) and the old infant school on your left. At the mini roundabout turn right, passing the pub, Follow the footpath, it does run out, so you need to cross over the road. Go over the bridge, and cross the road again and the car park is on your right.
